#### 2022-2027 Strategic Plan

#### Guardrail 1 – Safety:

The Superintendent may not allow a breach of safety policies and procedures that result in an increase in threatening or unsafe circumstances for students and staff.

# **PROMISE Implementation in 2013-2014**

"The PROMISE program is an intervention program designed to address the unique needs of students (Grades K-12), who have committed a specific non-violent misdemeanor that might normally lead to a juvenile delinquency arrest and, therefore, entry into the juvenile justice system. In addition, it serves students who have committed behavior infractions related to bullying and harassment."

# **PROMISE Implementation Today**

"PROMISE is a school-based prearrest/diversion program designed to correct student behavior that violates this policy (5.8) or Policy 5006: Suspension and Expulsion through a comprehensive set of supports and education. PROMISE is designed to address eligible policy violations that may rise to the level of entrance into the delinquency system.

PROMISE is a mandatory program assignment for eligible students of at least 11 years of age and/or enrolled in a District 6-12 school program. PROMISE incidents for said students shall accrue through 12<sup>th</sup> grade with a maximum of three (3) referral assignments to the program, and participation documented in the Juvenile Information System (JJIS) Prevention Web."


## Legislation and Reports Guiding the PROMISE Program

 Title XLVIII
 Chapter 1006
 View Entire Chapter

 EARLY LEARNING-20 EDUCATION CODE
 SUPPORT FOR LEARNING

1006.13 Policy of zero tolerance for crime and victimization.-

(1) District school boards shall promote a safe and supportive learning environment in schools by protecting students and staff from conduct that poses a threat to school safety. A threat assessment team may use alternatives to expulsion or referral to law enforcement agencies to address disruptive behavior through restitution, civil citation, teen court, neighborhood restorative justice, or similar programs. Zero-tolerance policies may not be rigorously applied to petty acts of misconduct. Zero-tolerance policies must apply equally to all students regardless of their economic status, race, or disability.





#### Additional Revisions to PROMISE Program Since 2019


- Requirement for follow-up and notification of noncompliance to the state attorney's office.
- Limitation on the maximum number of referrals for eligibility to participate in a prearrest diversion program.
- Requirement for diversion program referrals to be cumulative and eliminate a "reset" each school year for offenses counted for diversion programs.
- Requirement that all prearrest diversion programs report data to DJJ in Prevention Web or another common database in an effort to eliminate information silos.
- Specify that nothing in the criteria shall limit a law enforcement officer from making an arrest or interfere with law enforcement officer's authority to enforce the law. Law enforcement shall retain discretion to decide if an arrest should be made.

The above-mentioned changes were driven by State statute and/or recommendations of the MSD Commission or Statewide Audit of Prearrest Diversion programs.

#### School Arrests 2017-2022



# School-related Arrests 2017-2022


Broward County Arrests per 1,000 Student Population





- Provide targeted, site-based prevention programs to address student behaviors;
   i.e., Substance Abuse Prevention, Choose Peace Stop Violence.
- Provide professional learning for faculty and staff at targeted schools to address target behaviors school-wide, by classroom, and by individual student through Rethink ED and Suite360.

# PROMISE is an acronym for...

Preventing Recidivism through Opportunities, Mentoring, Interventions, Supports and Education







#### Alcohol-Use/Possession

Possession or use of alcohol or alcoholic beverages. Use means the person is caught in the act of using, admits to use or is discovered to have used in the course of an investigation. Alcohol incidents cannot be identified, treated, or coded as drug-related. It must be reported as alcohol related.

Examples	Non-examples			
Student possessing or using alcohol.	<ul> <li>Student smelled of alcohol who, after investigation, was found to be diabetic.</li> </ul>			

#### Related SESIR Definition (Effective 1/17/23)

(possession, use, or sale) Possession, sale, purchase, <u>distribution</u>, or use of alcoholic beverages. Use means the person is caught in the act of using, admits to use or is discovered to have used in the course of an investigation. Alcohol incidents cannot be Drug-related.



#### Alcohol-Sale/Attempted Sale/Transmittal

 Sale, purchase, transmittal or distribution of alcohol or alcoholic beverages.
 Alcohol incidents cannot be identified, treated, or coded as drug-related. It must be reported as alcohol related.

Examples	Non-examples
Student selling alcohol.	<ul> <li>Student caught using alcohol. Refer to A1- Alcohol Use/Possession.</li> <li>Student smelled of alcohol who, after investigation, was found to be diabetic.</li> </ul>

#### Related SESIR Definition (Effective 1/17/23)

(possession, use, or sale) Possession, sale, purchase, <u>distribution</u>, or use of alcoholic beverages. Use means the person is caught in the act of using, admits to use or is discovered to have used in the course of an investigation. Alcohol incidents cannot be Drug-related.



#### Drug-Use/Possession of Leaf Marijuana (Less than 20g)

 Use/Possession of leaf marijuana less than 20 grams. Use means the person is caught in the act of using, admits to the use or is discovered to have used marijuana on campus in the course of an investigation. Possession is the knowing, intentional, deliberate or inadvertent control of any substance.

Examples	Non-examples
<ul> <li>Student found in possession of or using leaf marijuana, less than 20g.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Student found inhaling or ingesting intoxicants, glue, solvents or aerosols for hallucinogenic purposes. Refer to DA-Being under the Influence of Leaf Marijuana and/or Mood-altering Substances.</li> <li>Student or other person using nicotine/JUUL liquid pod. Refer to EC-Tobacco-E-Cigarettes, Vapor Devices or Similar.</li> <li>Student or other reporting to school or school-sponsored event while under the influence of marijuana after having used the substance at a location other than the school or event. Refer to DA-Being under the Influence of Leaf Marijuana and/or Mood-altering substances.</li> </ul>



#### Drug Paraphernalia

- Any equipment, product, or material of any kind, which is used, intended for use, or designed for use by ingesting, inhaling or otherwise introducing and/or causing a chemical, substance or drug to be entered into the human body (i.e., THC pod confirmed through test kit).
- **Note:** If vapor device contains an unauthorized substances such as THC/CBD oil, this is the appropriate incident type for the object. If it contains nicotine, please refer to the appropriate incident type EC-Tobacco-E-Cigarettes, Vapor Devices or Similar.

Exar	nples	Non-examples
• S	tudent's hookah-pen yielded a positive esult for THC/CBD. tudent or other discovered to have a grinder in their possession along with a bag of leaf marijuana.	<ul> <li>Student's liquid pod was discovered to contain nicotine. Refer to EC-Tobacco-E- Cigarettes, Vapor Devices or Similar.</li> </ul>



#### Drug-related SESIR Definition (No update from previous SESIR definition)

(illegal drug possession or use) The use or possession of any drug, narcotic, controlled substance, or any substance when used for chemical intoxication. Use means the person is caught in the act of using, admits to use or is discovered to have used in the course of an investigation.



#### Fighting-Major (Mutual Combat)

• Mutual combat or mutual altercation. When two or more persons mutually participate in use of force or physical violence resulting in injury **requiring professional medical attention**. Such instances may or may not involve adult physical intervention.

Examples	Non-examples
<ul> <li>Student becoming engaged in a fight, which results in the need for professional medical attention for one or both of the participants.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Student engaging in "horseplay."</li> <li>Student verbally confronting another student/teacher.</li> <li>Student or other engaging in pushing and shoving who is easily separated or stopped.</li> <li>Student or other engaging in a fight, which is resolved without injury or need for physical intervention.</li> </ul>

#### Related SESIR Definition (No update from previous SESIR definition)

(mutual combat, mutual altercation) When two or more persons mutually participate in use of force or physical violence that requires either physical intervention or results in injury requiring first aid or medical attention. Lower-level fights, including pushing, shoving, or altercations that stop on verbal command are not required to be reported in SESIR.



#### **Disruption on Campus - Major**

 A major disruption of all or a significant portion of campus activity, schoolsponsored events, or school bus transportation. Disruptive behavior that poses a serious threat to the learning environment, health, safety, or welfare of others.

Examples	Non-examples
<ul> <li>Student or other inciting a riot.</li> <li>Student or other cause an incident that results in closing the cafeteria.</li> <li>Student or other causing an incident that prevents other students from proceeding to the next class or prevents egress.</li> <li>Student or other causing disruption at the school bus loading area that prevents or delays the bus or buses from entering or leaving, or the loading or unloading of that location.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Disruption of a single classroom.</li> <li>Student disobeying or showing disrespect to others.</li> <li>Student defying authority.</li> <li>Student or other person who intentionally activates the fire alarm or places a 911 call without actual cause of a fire or emergency situation, thereby wrongly signaling a need to evacuate. Refer to F9- False Fire Alarm/911.</li> <li>Student or other using obscene or inappropriate language or gestures.</li> <li>Student not sitting in seat and/or talking loudly while school bus is moving.</li> </ul>



#### Disruption on Campus - Major

#### Related SESIR Definition (No update from previous SESIR definition)

(major disruption of all or a significant portion of campus activities, schoolsponsored events, and school bus transportation) Disruptive behavior that poses a serious threat to the learning environment, health, safety, or welfare of others. Examples of major disruptions include bomb threats, inciting a riot, or initiating a false fire alarm.



#### Trespassing

 The illegal entry onto campus or school board facility/property. To enter or remain on school grounds, school transportation, or at a school-sponsored event, without authorization or invitation and with no lawful purpose for entry.

Examples	Non-examples
<ul> <li>Any unauthorized person entering the campus and arrested for trespass.</li> <li>Any unauthorized person remaining on property after being directed to leave by the administrator or designee, with no intent to commit a criminal act.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Parent entering the building to pick up his/her child without first getting clearance through the office.</li> <li>Person searching for assistance at a school facility after his/her car has broken down.</li> </ul>



#### Trespassing

#### Related SESIR Definition (Effective 1/17/23)

(illegal entry onto campus) To enter or remain on school grounds/campus, school transportation, or at a school-sponsored event/off campus, without authorization or invitation and with no lawful purpose for entry. <u>Only incidents involving a student</u> <u>currently under suspension or expulsion, or incidents where any offender (student or non-student) was previously issued an official trespass warning by school officials, or where any offender was arrested for trespass are required to be reported in SESIR. Trespass incidents that did not have a prior official warning, did not result in arrest, or did not involve students under suspension or expulsion or expulsion should be reported as locally defined incidents according to district policies.</u>



#### Larceny/Theft-Petty (Less than \$750)

• The unauthorized taking, carrying, riding away with, or concealing the property of another person without threat, violence, or bodily harm. The item(s) value must be less than \$750.

Examples	Non-examples
<ul> <li>Student or other stealing an item/items less than \$750.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Student or other borrowing an item without permission.</li> <li>Student or other stealing an item/items greater than \$750. Refer to T6-Larceny/Theft-Grand (Greater than or equal to \$750.</li> </ul>

### Criminal Mischief Vandalism/Damage to Property (Less than \$1,000) - Title
